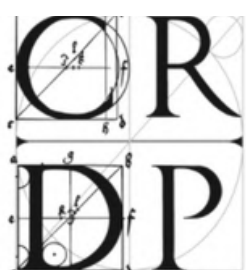

THE DIGITAL TRANSFORMATION OF THE PUBLIC SECTOR

The Legal Workshop on the Digital Transformation of the Public Sector is organised by four PhD candidates from European universities: University of Basel (Switzerland), University of Paris Nanterre (France), University of Lyon III (France) and the European University Institute (Italy). Held at the University of Basel, it aims to bring together international doctoral students working in the field of digital public law.

The workshop consists of three intensive days of research and is designed to alternate between individual presentations and group discussions. The number of participants is limited, as the main objective of the workshop is to help the doctoral students in the writing of their thesis. The diversity in the students' profiles will allow peer reviewing, feedback, and discussions, while at the same time gaining knowledge in different (but related) fields. These moments of exchange will enable PhD candidates to gain a deeper understanding of the issues raised by the use of digital technologies by the administration in each of the countries represented. Participants will have the opportunity to present their research so that everyone can benefit from their expertise.

In addition, in order to further enrich those exchanges, leading European scholars will be invited to give presentations on technical and methodological topics (e.g. introduction to AI and machine learning, methodology of legal research on emerging technologies, etc.). By inviting speakers and experts to discuss about topics related to digitisation, artificial intelligence and legal research on new technologies, the workshop aims to promote interdisciplinarity. It enables participants to gain a comprehensive understanding of the various issues involved in the digital transformation of the public sector.

In addition, the event seeks to establish a network of young researchers in the field of public digital law. It aims to foster collaboration beyond national borders and to lay solid foundations for future joint research projects.

In conclusion, the workshop is a unique opportunity for young researchers to exchange ideas, acquire interdisciplinary knowledge, and establish valuable links in the field of digital public law. It aims to contribute to the advancement of knowledge in this field while fostering international cooperation among emerging scholars.

GUEST SPEAKERS

Nadja Braun Binder

University of Basel



Nadja Braun Binder is Professor of Public Law at the Faculty of Law of the University of Basel and co-director of the electronic Public Institutions and Administrations Research Forum (e-PIAF). She studied law at the University of Bern, where she completed her PhD on the subject of voting secrecy. Her academic career took her to the Research Institute for Public Administration in Speyer (Germany) in 2011. In 2017, she completed her habilitation at the German University of Administrative Sciences Speyer with a thesis on European tax law and was appointed to the Faculty of Law at the University of Zurich, where she worked as an assistant professor of public law with a special focus on European democracy issues until 2019.

Her current research interests include the digital transformation of public administration, political rights and democracy.

Lucie Cluzel Métayer

University of Paris Nanterre

Lucie Cluzel-Métayer is Professor of public law at the University of Paris Nanterre, a member of the Centre de recherches sur le droit public (CRDP) and renowned for her expertise in digital public law. She is co-director of the Master's degree in Digital Law and the Doctoral School of Law and Political Science at University Paris Nanterre. Her research focuses on public service law and digital public law. She has co-edited several books, including one on the digital transformation of public services and another on elements of digital public law.



Apollo Dauag

University of Basel



Apollo Dauag is a habilitation candidate at the chair of Prof. Nadja Braun Binder and scientific managing director of the electronic Public Institutions and Administrations Research Forum (e-PIAF) at the Law Faculty of the University of Basel. He has been working as an attorney since 2013 and advises private individuals, companies and public institutions on various digital topics. His dissertation on the evidentiary aspects of civil proceedings against cloud providers was published in 2021. As part of his habilitation project with Prof. Nadja Braun Binder, he is investigating the influence of science on digital legislation in Switzerland (to the research portrait). In his role as co-leader of the digital specialist group of the Basel-Stadt Bar Association he examines the digital transformation of legal practices, and is committed to open access publications on Swiss law with [Repositoryum.ch](https://www.repository.ch).

Catherine Egli

Advisor and litigator at Public Sector Law Zurich

Catherine Egli advises and litigates in the public sector. To this end, she particularly examines the functions of the State. What is the role of the State and which tasks should be left to society? In which manner should the State manifest itself and how can the State ensure that current challenges such as digital transformation and climate change do not occur at the expense of human rights?

Before joining Public Sector Law as an Associate, Catherine studied law at the Universities of Basel, Geneva and Paris. In addition to various internships at the Criminal Court of Basel-Stadt, leading law firms and the Swiss Embassy in Washington D.C., she also worked at the Federal Office of Justice and the University of Basel before being admitted to the Swiss bar in 2023.



Thomas Le Goff

Institut Polytechnique Paris - Télécom Paris



Dr. Thomas Le Goff is an Assistant Professor of Law & Technology at Telecom Paris, Institut Polytechnique de Paris. He teaches and researches topics related to the regulation of digital technologies, data, cybersecurity and AI. His research focuses on the links between AI and sustainability, from a legal and public policy perspective. Prior to working in academia, he worked as an in-house legal counsel at Electricité de France (EDF), within the IP, digital and data legal department, where he was in charge of data protection and digital regulation expertise. Thomas graduated from University Paris Cité (PhD and Master's), University of Exeter (LLM) and University of Rennes 1 (LLB and Master's). He wrote his PhD thesis on AI regulation in the energy sector, including an in-depth analysis of the AI Act and first proposals to incorporate environmental sustainability in AI regulation.

Esther Zysset

Advisor and litigator at Public Sector Law Zurich

Esther Zysset has been practising public law for over ten years. In particular, she advises public institutions, namely in the field of higher education and religious organisations. She also has broad experience in the telecom sector and the digital economy.

Before joining Public Sector Law as partner she worked both independently as a lawyer and as associate and trainee in international law firms in Geneva (Sidley Austin LLP, Lenz & Staehelin). She was also General Counsel of SWITCH in Zurich (2012-2016), where she was responsible amongst other things for administrative law, IT, data protection and telecommunications law. In her PhD she focused on administrative contracts between the State and private entities (2021).

Marc-Olivier Busslinger

University of Geneva



Marc-Olivier Busslinger is a PhD candidate at the University of Geneva. His thesis focuses on e-government and federalism in Swiss law. He is interested in the digital transformation of authorities, and in the influence of digitisation on the rights of individuals. His thesis examines the tension between federalism, one of Switzerland's structuring constitutional principles, and the rationalisation of state action that justifies the digitisation of administrative processes. He is currently a member of the committee of the Swiss forum for young public law scholars.

Hermine Cappé

University of Rennes

Her name is Hermine Cappé, and she is a PhD candidate in cybersecurity law at Rennes University (France). Despite what her thesis subject might suggest, she does not consider herself a geek—unless, of course, being a huge fan of Star Wars and watching anime qualifies her as one. Her academic background is focused on public law and international public law. She shifted towards digital law and cybersecurity law during her first Master 2, exploring various topics such as artificial intelligence, blockchains, and data law. She has a passion for teaching and university research, but she also aspires to be a lawyer. She is eagerly looking forward to the discussions and individual presentations during the workshop, as she believes it will be a fulfilling experience for everyone.



Mélanie Gornet

Institut Polytechnique Paris - Télécom Paris



Mélanie Gornet is a PhD candidate. In her research, she focuses on the regulation of artificial intelligence, encompassing social, legal and technical aspects. Notably, she has been studying the relationship between technical standards, the CE marking that will be required for high-risk AI systems under the AI Act, and respect for fundamental rights. She looks at standardization initiatives around “trustworthy AI”, including standards on bias and non-discrimination, and asks whether it is ever possible to certify that an AI system complies with fundamental rights? Her background is in engineering (MSc ISAE-SUPAERO in data science and AI) and political science (M2 SciencesPo in international affairs), but her PhD is interdisciplinary. Also, she is a huge rugby fan and she volunteered for feminist and LGBTQ+ associations.

Nina Laukenmann

University of Basel

Nina Laukenmann is currently working as an assistant to Prof. Nadja Braun Binder and as a cyber project manager at the DDPS. Since January 2024 she is a doctoral candidate at the Faculty of Law in Basel. She studied law at the University of Zurich (MLaw) and subsequently completed an LL.M. with a specialisation in international and transnational criminal law at the University of Amsterdam.



Maria Estela Lopez

European University Institute



Maria Estela Lopes is a Ph.D. Researcher at the European University Institute, exploring how natural and legal persons can participate in AI systems' development in the public sector. Her research delves into the intersection of administrative law, public procurement, and AI, focusing on the intricacies of the technical processes of AI development in the public sector and the significant influence of private entities in shaping public sector technology. Drawing from her academic background, including an LL.M. from the Catholic University of Portugal and a Bachelor of Laws from NOVA Law School, alongside her practical experience as a qualified lawyer in Portugal and a teaching assistant at the Catholic University of Portugal, she brings a multifaceted perspective to her research.

Irit Milkes

Irit Milkes is a lawyer and researcher at Universidad Externado de Colombia. Since 2015, she has been part of the Administrative Law Department, as a Researcher. She is pursuing a PhD in Law at the University of Barcelona, with a research focus on how both Public Administration and the private sector manage risks and engage with emerging technologies. Her research investigates risk management strategies, their enforcement mechanisms, and the legal ramifications of their application. The goal is to shed light on the fundamental role of Public Administration in safeguarding public interests amidst the challenges posed by regulation and the integration of Artificial Intelligence in public affairs.

Basel is a city in northwestern Switzerland on the river Rhine. Basel is Switzerland's third-most-populous city (after Zürich and Geneva), with 177,595 inhabitants within the city municipality limits. The official language of Basel is (the Swiss variety of Standard) German, and the main spoken language is the local Basel German dialect.

Basel is commonly considered to be the cultural capital of Switzerland and the city is famous for its many museums, including the Kunstmuseum, which is the first collection of art accessible to the public in the world (1661) and the largest museum of art in Switzerland, the Fondation Beyeler (located in Riehen), the Museum Tinguely and the Museum of Contemporary Art, which is the first public museum of contemporary art in Europe. Forty museums are spread throughout the city-canton, making Basel one of the largest cultural centres in relation to its size and population in Europe.
